2025 has been another great year of achievement for Liverpool Philharmonic. As one of the most ambitious and significant music organisations in the UK, in one of the world's greatest music cities, we continue to inspire, entertain and collaborate with people of all backgrounds through extraordinary music and creative experiences that bring communities together.

This year, we oversaw a major change in leadership with the retirement of Michael Eakin and appointment of Vanessa Reed as our Chief Executive. On behalf of the Board, I'd like to thank Michael for more than 16 years of brilliant leadership and his instrumental role developing the successful organisation we have today. After an international search, we have been delighted to welcome Vanessa back to the UK from New York, whose energy and genuine passion for Liverpool Philharmonic will take us forward on the next exciting stage of our journey.

Through the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra and our venues - Liverpool Philharmonic Hall and Music Room - we have brought bold, distinctive, and unforgettable performances featuring artists from the Northwest and around the globe.

This year, we were honoured to welcome Sir Simon Rattle back home to Liverpool for a

special performance with the Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra, almost 50 years to the day since their last visit. We have continued to support new music with a series of premieres from emerging composers in the Northwest, including Rushworth Composition Prize winner Grace-Evangeline Mason.

Beyond the stage, through our pioneering Learning and Community Outreach programmes, we support our community and nurture talent from cradle to career. This includes In Harmony which supports young people from some of Liverpool's most disadvantaged communities. As a cultural anchor and global ambassador for Liverpool, we welcome and collaborate with artists, audiences and communities of all backgrounds in shared experiences that uplift the human spirit and transform lives.

Our partnership in Barrow has continued to flourish this year. Since the programme launched in January 2024, we have presented 240 performances in 62 unique locations reaching 12,000 people. This year we also launched our In Harmony-inspired Youth Hubs and were honoured to join the community to celebrate the visit of our Patron, His Majesty King Charles III, for the naming of the Royal Port of Barrow.

I am personally very passionate about Liverpool Philharmonic's groundbreaking Music and Health programme which supports people alongside the NHS. It was fantastic to see this work recognised with



the Culture for Wellbeing Award at this year's Northern Music Awards. We've seen the programme expand with a new partnership with the Cheshire and Wirral Partnership Trust NHS Foundation in their specialist Mother and Baby mental health hospital.

I wish to thank my fellow Board members for the support they have given me, and for their contribution over the last year. On behalf of the Board, I wish to thank all our partners and funders, our staff and musicians, members of the Choir and Youth Company, our volunteers and everyone who has joined us as an audience member or participant for their support of Liverpool Philharmonic throughout the year.

When I became Chief Executive in May 2025, I was immediately impressed by the way Liverpool Philharmonic brings joy to so many people and I continue to be inspired by the breadth of work our outstanding team delivers. We are more than the city region's anchor music institution - we're a welcoming space that collaborates with and supports local communities in Liverpool and beyond.


By the end of my first three months I had also experienced our Orchestra's outstanding performances in London with our Chief Conductor Domingo Hindoyan. These concerts at the Barbican Centre and BBC Proms highlighted our national and international significance, showcasing music and composers from the Americas and upholding our commitment to sharing the stage with young people who are at the heart of our future plans.

2025 has been a year of celebrations including the 185th anniversary of the society, but also 10 years of the Rushworth Composition Prize, 75 years of Youth Orchestra and 10 years of our grassroots venue, the Music Room. We are now embarking on an exciting new chapter, which will see us being more ambitious about our range of partnerships, our global profile, and the way we bring people together closer to home. This includes plans to build a recording studio and rehearsal spaces in Liverpool which will drive our city region's support of future talent and innovation.

As the UK's oldest symphony orchestra, we are proud of our rich musical heritage, but we're resolutely invested in creating unforgettable experiences for future generations. We are here for everyone in our city region – a magical place that has music in its DNA.

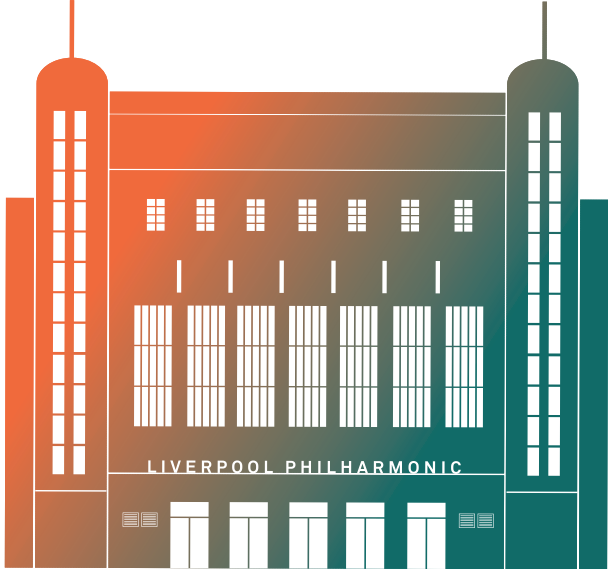

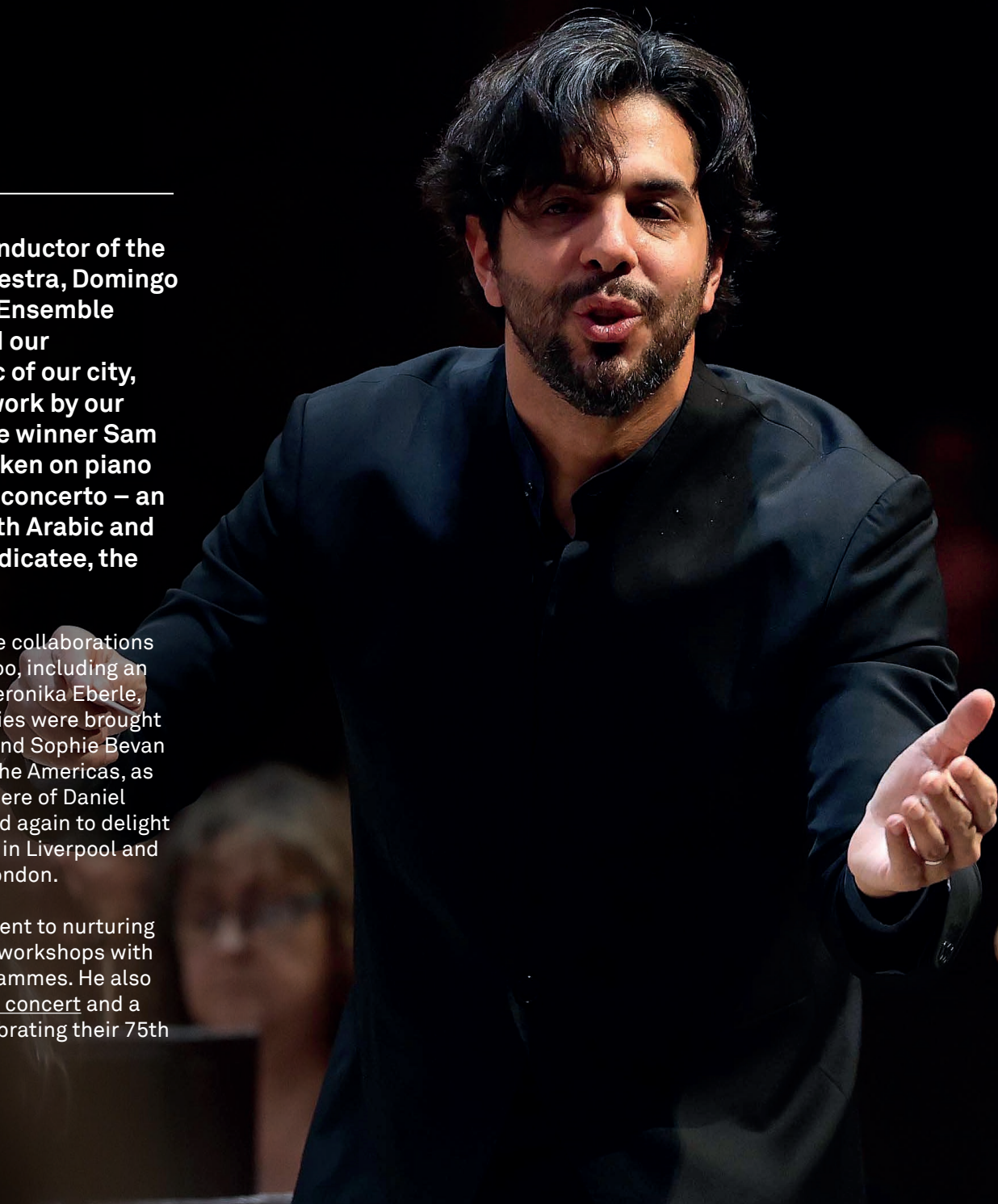


Domingo Hindoyan, Chief Conductor

Now in his fifth season as Chief Conductor of the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra, Domingo Hindoyan kicked off 2025 with his Ensemble 10:10 debut. This concert captured our commitment to the classical music of our city, featuring the world premiere of a work by our ninth Rushworth Composition Prize winner Sam Kane, Liverpool's own William Bracken on piano and Kareem Roustom's 2019 violin concerto – an homage to Mozart's fascination with Arabic and Turkish music, performed by its dedicatee, the acclaimed Michael Barenboim.

The rest of the year featured unforgettable collaborations with star soloists and diverse repertoire too, including an evening of Beethoven featuring violinist Veronika Eberle, while Mahler's Third and Fourth Symphonies were brought to life by the voices of Jennifer Johnston and Sophie Bevan MBE. Pacho Flores brought us sounds of the Americas, as the Dream Team reunited for the UK premiere of Daniel Freiberg's *Historias de Flores y Tangos*, and again to delight audiences in the Season Opening Concert in Liverpool and also reach millions at the BBC Proms in London.

Domingo has also continued his commitment to nurturing the next generation of musicians through workshops with our In Harmony and Youth Company programmes. He also conducted at In In Harmony 16th Birthday concert and a special concert with Youth Orchestra celebrating their 75th season.

Benjamin Appl, Baritone

Benjamin Appl started his 2024/25 residency with his conducting debut of Handel's *Messiah* in January. He then took the chamber series by storm with a performance of *Widmann's Schumannliebe* in March, followed by a personal homage to his friend and former teacher Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau in June. Benjamin also led the festivities in the 2025 Spirit of Christmas concerts.



Mark Simpson, Clarinettist and Composer

Liverpool-born clarinettist and composer and former member of the Merseyside Youth Orchestra, Mark Simpson began his residency for the 2025/26 season with a UK premiere of his piece *Hold Your Heart in Your Teeth, Concerto for viola and orchestra* performed with viola player Timothy Ridout. Mark will then be taking to the stage himself in 2026 for a series of chamber and solo recitals

With over 300 new works premiered and commissioned in the last 20 years, the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra is one of the most active orchestras in the UK in supporting new music. We're proud to have platformed over 20 living composers this year, and to have presented a series of world and UK premieres.

Liverpool Philharmonic is at the forefront of positive change through some of the widest-reaching and longest-running music-based youth and community engagement programmes in the UK. Through In Harmony and Youth Company alone, we reach over 2,000 young people every week.

Each year, more than 130,000 people access music through activities, performances and award-winning partnerships with the NHS, schools, and community organisations, including in some of the city's most disadvantaged areas.

We have established a clear pipeline where young people can develop their talent and learn new skills, contributing to greater employability and life chances.

Hollie has been involved with In Harmony since its inception in 2009. Starting at primary school, she was then in Youth Academy Orchestra, and has now been part of our Youth Orchestra for three years:

"I've had so many amazing opportunities in my journey so far. As well as playing the cello and learning music skills I've been given an outlet to be myself. I still feel as free as ever when I play and my true personality flourishes. I've gained friends from all over the country. If it wasn't for In Harmony I've no idea where I'd be or what I'd be interested in."

Learning

We strive to ensure that everyone at any age or stage in their life can access the transformative power of live music. Our youngest audience members are reached through a variety of activities in our school and early years programme, providing spaces for babies, children and families to connect and begin a lifelong love of music.

Tots In Harmony

Over 30 babies and their families attend activities in family and community centres each week.



Under 5s

This year we have welcomed **823 under 5s** and their families to nine specially crafted orchestral concerts in Liverpool and in Barrow.

Schools' Concerts

We welcomed over **18,000 children** and teachers to eight specially crafted orchestral concerts. This year we were proud to share music from across the world with some of our creative partners including Milap and Africa Oyé.



Perinatal Care

As part of our Music and Health programme, we use live music to support perinatal care. **This year we've connected with 129 people.**



Alder Hey Children's Hospital

Two of our specialist musicians work with children, young people and families as part of residencies to boost wellbeing and connection.



Free tickets to secondary schools

372 students booked orchestral concerts for free.

Family Concerts

This year, the Orchestra presented **four specially crafted concerts** designed for families.



We believe in people's potential and exist to create opportunities, particularly for those who don't have access to regular music-making. This is why there are currently over 2,280 young people participating in our music activities in and outside of school... each week! Young musicians are given the opportunity to engage with music-making regularly to develop their passion for music and shape the future of our city region.

In Harmony Liverpool Philharmonic

Our flagship programme has been running for 16 years in some of the most deprived areas of the city. We bring regular music-making into schools and after-school clubs. **2025 saw over 1,800 young people aged 0-18 learning music every week, free of charge.** We proudly expanded our Youth Hubs and have **193 young people on our 11-18 programme, with 80 of those on our talent development pathway.**



In July, **450 young musicians** performed alongside members of the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra to celebrate the 16th birthday of In Harmony.



In August, members of Youth Company and In Harmony performed alongside the Orchestra at the Royal Albert Hall for the BBC Proms.

Liverpool Philharmonic Youth Company

In 2025, 500 young people accessed musician training across nine ensembles. We celebrated 30 years of Youth Choir and members performed in exciting concerts, everywhere from Philharmonic Hall to the Labour Party Conference. We are delighted that now over 10% of our Youth Company members have come up from the In Harmony programme.



In May, Youth Company musicians and members of In Harmony Chamber Stars performed at a community event at The Reader in Calderstones Park.



Youth Choir performed in the annual Spirit of Christmas concerts with a special performance from the Youth Brass Band outside the Hall.



In Harmony musicians spoke with Culture Secretary Lisa Nandy about their time with In Harmony and the positive impact of music education in their lives.



Liverpool Philharmonic has a longstanding commitment to supporting grassroots and emerging talent. We are dedicated to nurturing the next generation of musicians, ensuring the Liverpool City Region remains a global centre for musical excellence.

Programmes such as the Rushworth Composition Prize and Emerging Musicians Fellowship champion early career musicians, giving them the skills, confidence and support to succeed in the music industry and our ongoing work with the University of Liverpool and Music Industry partners ensure opportunities are made available to anyone wanting to join the music industry, in any capacity.

Emerging Musicians Fellowship

Each year we support early-career orchestral musicians with a year-long, paid music placement to learn and experience professional orchestral life. We were delighted to welcome this year's musicians: Nia Williams (cello), Sam Willsmore (cor anglais with oboe), Emily Crook (clarinet) and Ramon Branch Biescas (tuba).



University of Liverpool

We are proud to continue our partnership with the University of Liverpool to support their students' learning and development.

Rushworth Composition Prize

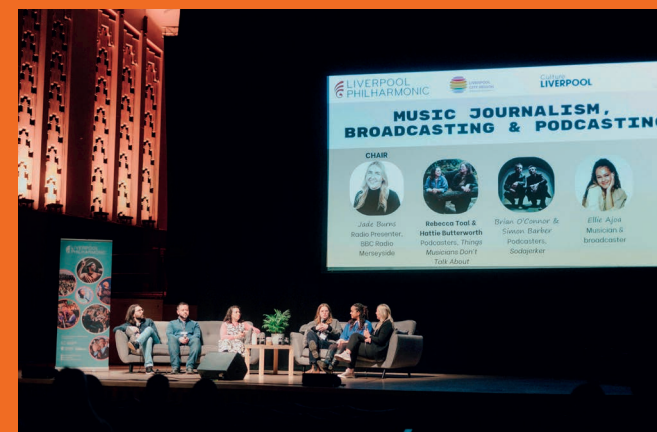
This year we announced Andrew Barney as the tenth winner of the prize.

Music Industry Careers Fest

We welcomed 703 people to the largest event of its kind in the North West, providing hands-on workshops and panel discussions from some of the leading figures in the music industry.



Health and Wellbeing



Music has the power to change the course of your life and wellbeing. From working closely with the NHS for 18 years, we have witnessed firsthand the beneficial impact music can have on recovery from mental and physical ill health.

We are also acutely aware of the pressures faced by professional musicians. Since 2015 our Performance and Wellbeing programme has worked to provide a comprehensive range of physical and mental health support, and wide-ranging professional development opportunities for our musicians.

Young Sounds

This year we have continued our role in the Music Opportunities Pilot, led by Young Sounds UK and partners. This three-year project builds on the success of our Performance and Wellbeing programme and our expertise working with young people from low socio-economic backgrounds to produce a toolkit for young musicians, tutors and parents regarding health and wellbeing within music education.



Music and Health



Since 2008 we have supported over 34,000 patients and participants.



This year, our Music and Health programme won the Culture for Wellbeing Award at the Northern Music Awards.



In December we welcomed a new NHS partner: the Cheshire and Wirral Partnership NHS Foundation Trust, working in their brand-new specialist Mother and Baby mental health hospital.



We celebrated ten years of our Social Prescribing programme Music Mondays.

We are grateful to our current partners: Mersey Care NHS Foundation Trust, Clatterbridge Cancer Centre Foundation Trust, The Walton Centre NHS Foundation Trust and Alder Hey Children's Hospital NHS Foundation Trust.

Health and Wellbeing Toolkit

This year we partnered with UK charity Help Musicians to launch 'A Symphony of Good Sense', a pioneering new toolkit created to combat the high injury rates amongst orchestral musicians.

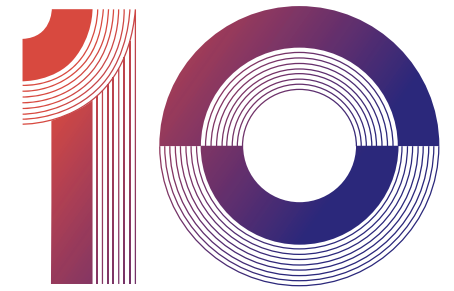

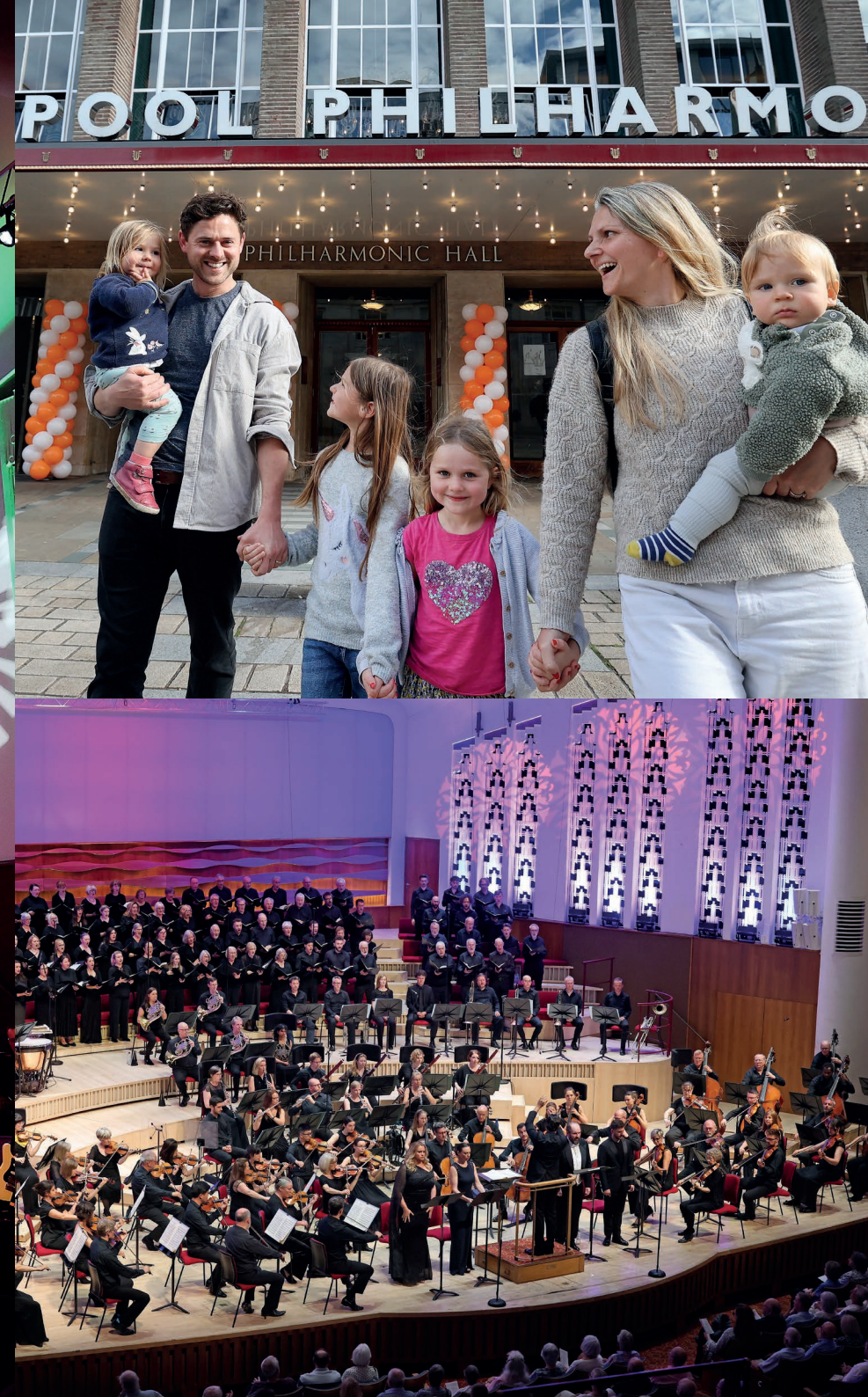

Our Music City

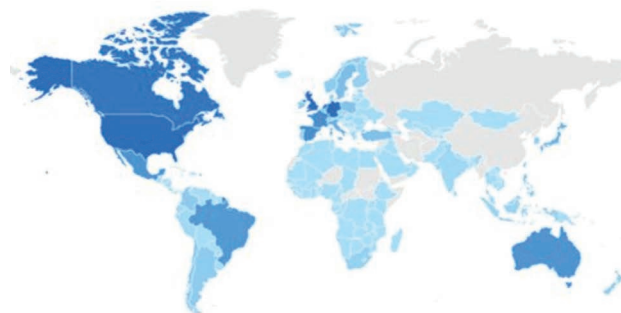

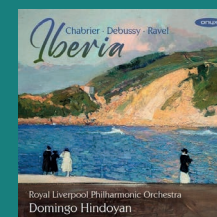

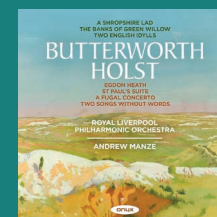

Accessibility and Belonging

Our goal is for everyone to feel welcome and included. We want to celebrate the diverse talent of our city region on our stages, in our audiences and in our staff. We understand that it is our responsibility to remove any barriers that people find when accessing our spaces, and though there is always more to do, here are just a few of the ways in which we are striving to increase accessibility.



Creative partnerships are a vital and valued part of Liverpool Philharmonic. From collaborating with community and music organisations across the city for events like Open Day and Careers Fest, to hosting musical takeovers and arts festivals such as Africa Oyé, Luma Creations, Pagoda Arts, and the Liverpool Arab Arts Festival, artistic partnerships are integral to our programme.



Leap into Live Music! is designed to give individuals who have never attended a concert or event at Liverpool Philharmonic Hall, and who might not typically have the opportunity, the chance to enjoy live music without the concern of cost. This year, we distributed over 1000 free and discounted tickets through this initiative.

Our Access Scheme currently supports 4,500 people with mobility issues, disabilities or other needs. This enables them to access support to help them attend concerts safely and comfortably.

This year we hosted nine concerts with incorporated British Sign Language and implemented a new digital hearing assistance system.

Attitude is Everything: We are one of only two venues in Liverpool and 17 in the whole of the UK to be awarded Attitude is Everything Gold level in relation to our accessibility for disabled customers, artists and staff.

Recruiting Classical: We are proud to continue our work with Black Lives in Music in their Recruiting Classical programme which aims to increase representation and diversity in the classical music sector.

This year, we are proud to have worked with Strawberry Fields, Liverpool University Future Families and Everton in the Community to support more people from local communities into employment.



Our work in Barrow



It's been another fantastic year bringing the Orchestra into the heart of Barrow-in-Furness. Alongside our community partners, we've delivered 159 performances reaching an estimated total of 7,205 people.

We've expanded our learning programme:

We've visited 95% of all primary schools and all secondary and SEND schools in Barrow and launched our brand new In Harmony-inspired Youth Hubs.
